

Abbas's 'genocide' UN speech offends



The US has slammed Palestinian Authority President Mahmoud Abbas's speech at the United Nations, in which he accused Israel of "genocide" against the Palestinians, saying it was "offensive" and undermined peace efforts.

In Abbas's address to the UN General Assembly, he demanded an end to the occupation, accused Israel of waging a "war of genocide" in Gaza and asserted that Palestinians faced a future in a "most abhorrent form of apartheid" under Israeli rule. He said Israel was not interested in living in peace with its Palestinian neighbours.

Israeli leaders reacted with anger and scorn. "It's a speech of incitement full of lies," a spokesperson from the Prime Minister's Office said.

Israeli Foreign Minister Avigdor Liberman said that the PA president demonstrated that "he doesn't want to be, and cannot be, a partner for a logical diplomatic resolution. It's no coincidence that he joined a government with Hamas."

The former Yesha Council chairman said, "By using the word 'genocide', Abbas gave up the empathy of the Israeli public, including most of the left."

Netanyahu: UNHRC not investigating Hamas war crimes is absurd

Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu took the bitter criticism he leveled against the UN Human Rights Council in the UN General Assembly directly into the office of UN Secretary-General Ban Ki-moon, saying the forum was badly stacked against Israel and it defended Hamas, which used UN facilities over the summer to attack Israel.

The Prime Minister stressed that Israel did not intentionally target Palestinian civilians, and was sorry for every civilian casualty.

He said that Hamas has taken the local population hostage, and compared the organisation to Islamic State. He repeated his position that Hamas carried out a double war crime over the summer: firing on Israeli civilians, while hiding behind Palestinian civilians.

"I will not apologise for Israel having the Iron Dome to protect its citizens," he said.

Netanyahu complained that Israel was held to different standards from all other countries in the world. While some 200,000 people have been killed in Syria, he said, there is no proportionality between how much time the UN spends on Israel and on Syria.

He also stressed to Ban, who condemns every instance of Jewish building beyond the pre-1967 lines, that the conflict with the Palestinians is not over the settlements, but rather over Israel's right to exist in the region as a Jewish state.

Paradigm change for solving conflict

PM Netanyahu broke new ground in his recent speech before the UN General Assembly, speaking of an "historic opportunity." Countries in the region that were antagonistic toward Israel – ostensibly because of its conflict with the Palestinians – increasingly realise that they share common interests with the Jewish state. Jordan, Egypt, Saudi Arabia, and the UAE all see a nuclear Iran, an exultant Islamic State, and a reactionary Muslim Brotherhood as direct threats.

Jews share with the Christians, Kurds and Yazidis of the region similar threats and interests as well. For all these groups, defeating militant Islamists is an existential imperative. Rapprochement with the Arab world could also radically transform the paradigm for reconciliation between Israelis and Palestinians. Increasing cooperation between Israel and its neighbours can serve as a catalyst for a new, more creative solution that will enable Palestinians and Israelis to live together in peace.

We Jews – like the Kurds, the Christians, the Yazidis and other non-Muslim faith and ethnic groups – are an integral part of this region. Our roots go back over 3,000 years. It is only logical that a solution will be found to the Israeli-Palestinian conflict that includes input and support from the entire region in an atmosphere of mutual respect and cooperation.

The powerful explosion blew out the windows of buildings up to 15km away.

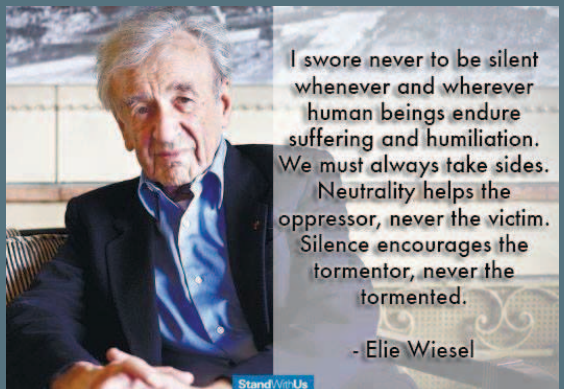

Michael Klinger – Journeyman Cricketer

The Western Warriors have for the next two years the services of Michael Klinger, one of the few Jewish first class cricketers. He starts his contract in WA in the Matador BBQs One Day Cup in the first match against South Australia at the Gabba in Brisbane on 7 October. When he is not playing with the Warriors, he'll be playing with the Mount Lawley Cricket Club at Cresswell Reserve.

Michael made his first class debut in 1998/99 for the Victorian Bushrangers, joined the South Australia Redbacks for the 2008/09 season, was named their Captain in 2010, and won the Allan Border Medal as Cricket Player of the Year in both 2009 and 2010. In the last two English summers he played County cricket for Gloucestershire.

He is a top order batsman and over his career has made 19 first class and 11 one-day centuries and one 20/20 century. Ironically, his highest first class score of 255 was made against the Western Warriors when playing for the Redbacks in November 2008. He was Outstanding Australian Jewish Sportsman of the Year in 1997, 2009 and 2010.

Michael has been a success at all forms of the game of cricket over his career. He was a prodigy boy cricketer and after graduating from Mount Scopus College was named Captain of the Australia Under 19 Men's Cricket team – his



deputy being Michael Clarke, now Captain of the Australian Test and One Day teams. He was in the Australian Cricket Team in the 1997 Maccabiah and on the Yarkon River Bridge when it collapsed and Australia lost four of its athletes. That was a horrific experience, particularly as for twenty minutes during the aftermath of the collapse, he and his brother, also in the team, were unable to find each other.

Despite his sporting prowess, Michael is a level headed, down-to-earth young man, unaffected by his successes at the highest level. In his move to Perth, Michael together with his wife Cindy and children Bailey, 4, and Summer, 2½, will be living in Yokine for the next two years. Michael is committed to bringing his family into the community, and we welcome them all.

Best wishes to Michael for a successful two years making lots of runs with the Western Warriors.

Australian ceremonies honour victims of Babi Yar Massacre

Hundreds gathered at ceremonies in Sydney and Melbourne to commemorate the anniversary of the Babi Yar massacre. 34,000 Jews were murdered in the Holocaust massacre, which happened over a two-day period in Ukraine in 1941.

Malcolm Turnbull, Federal Member for Wentworth, addressed the crowd at Waverley Memorial Gardens, calling for zero tolerance for racism, and insisting we cannot treat the Holocaust as something only in the past. "The lessons must be learnt and re-learned, again and again."

He said the Labor and Liberal parties are "absolutely, shoulder to shoulder united in our opposition, in our steadfast resolve, to oppose racial hatred and racism wherever it is found in the world but, above all, here in Australia."

The event also saw the unveiling of a plaque in memory of the Jews of Kiev, massacred by the Nazis and their Ukrainian collaborators, and in recognition of Soviet Jewish suffering. Alex Ryvchin, the public affairs director of the Executive Council of Australian Jewry (ECAJ), who was born in Kiev, thought up the idea of the plaque, which will serve as a permanent tribute and as an inspiration to learn about the history of European Jewry.

Israel joins international struggle to eradicate Ebola

In response to requests by many governments, the Secretary-General of the United Nations, the Director-General of the World Health Organisation as well as Israeli and international aid organisations, the Foreign Ministry has decided to increase Israel's contribution to the international effort to prevent the spreading of the Ebola epidemic.

MASHAV, Israel's Agency for International Development Cooperation, will send three mobile emergency clinics to areas in western Africa where there is a high risk of infection with Ebola.

The clinics, which were manufactured in Israel, were built in accordance with standards and guidelines of the World Health Organisation for the treatment of Ebola. A staff of medical experts will be attached to each clinic, and they will train the local practitioners in the operation of the clinic and its equipment. In addition, staff training will focus on preventing the spread of the disease and raising awareness among populations with high potential for infection.

An Israeli team has already been sent to Cameroon, where it was favorably received by the local authorities. The MFA also sent emergency equipment to the government of Sierra Leone, and in recent weeks shipped personal protection equipment to teams of the African Union.

US, Britain, Australia won't support Palestinian UN bid for statehood

Palestinian sources say their delegation to the UN has received a definitive "no" from the US, Britain and Australia regarding a proposed Security Council resolution setting a timetable for establishing a Palestinian state on the 1967 lines. China and Russia, as well as Jordan, told the Palestinians they would support such a resolution. The other states on the 15-member body did not give a definitive answer.

Palestinian officials say the US has been pressuring Arab states to recommend that consideration of the Palestinian proposal be postponed. It isn't clear when the Palestinian resolution might be submitted, and it is doubtful it would be submitted at all unless majority support is assured. *Haaretz*

Sweden to be first EU country to recognise Palestine

Sweden's new government is set to recognise the State of Palestine, in a move that will make it the first member of the European Union to do so.

During his inaugural speech, Sweden's Prime Minister Stefan Lofven said, "The two-state solution requires mutual recognition and a will to co-exist peacefully. Sweden will therefore recognise the state of Palestine."

In response, an Israeli Foreign Ministry official reprimanded the Swedish ambassador to Israel, arguing that the move encourages the Palestinians to pursue unilateral steps toward statehood, rather than seeking to restart direct talks with Israel.

US State Department spokeswoman Jen Psaki called the international recognition of a Palestinian state "premature." She added, "We certainly support Palestinian statehood, but it can only come through a negotiated outcome, a resolution of final status issues, and mutual recognition by both parties."

An Olympic memorial for Munich

The International Olympic Committee refused to hold a moment of silence in memory of the murdered Israeli athletes during the opening ceremony of the 2012 Olympic Games in London. Those games coincided with the 40th anniversary of the infamous terrorist attack by the Palestinian terrorist organisation Black September. So the moment was ripe for a reconsideration of this lacuna in history and memory.

But the leadership at the time did not have the moral courage or political will to get it done. The Olympic Committee balked with more of the usual excuses – that a moment of silence was inappropriate, would detract from the current athletes' moment, or would somehow politicise the games. Things may finally be changing.

In June, the IOC, under new leadership, confirmed that it would contribute \$250,000 toward a memorial for the Israeli victims of the attack. The German Olympic Sports Confederation had already pledged \$27,000 for the project, and the German government is moving ahead with a competition for the memorial's design. Construction is expected to be completed in early 2016.

Argentina's parliament supports Palestinian resistance

The Argentinian parliament has launched a fundraising drive 'Palestine Resists, Argentina Arises.' The announced objective is to launch several fundraising activities on behalf of "the zone affected by the military Operation Protective Edge."

During the event, the documentary *Checkpoint Rock: Songs From Palestine* was screened, followed by a debate led by Pedro Brieger, the Jewish journalist who justified on national public television the kidnapping and killing of three Israeli teens in June by Hamas operatives.

In a letter to the parliamentary organisers, the Simon Wiesenthal Centre wrote, "We stand in solidarity with those who have been victims of Hamas' violence, whether Israeli or Palestinian."

"Our centre favours humanitarian-aid initiatives to promote peace. But this is a campaign to abuse the goodwill of Argentine parliamentarians in order to endorse Hamas' anti-Semitic hate and violence."

SAJBD calls on ANC to play a constructive role in ME process

In his meeting with the leadership of the South African Jewish Board of Deputies (SAJBD) last week, President Jacob Zuma reiterated his government's support for a negotiated two-state solution to the Israeli-Palestinian question, and further, saw a role for South Africa to play in bringing this about.

The SAJBD expressed their disappointment at the ANC's recent call for a boycott against Israel. "This will not result in bringing about peace to the region but will only cause polarisation and division within our own society. In reality the main target of this boycott is South African Jewry. We have already seen how the importation of the Middle East conflict into this country by anti-Israel agitators has resulted in hostility and intimidation, including threats of violence to our community."

The SAJBD said the ANC's call for a boycott further undermines the Government's encouraging attempts to play a role in the peace process.

This notwithstanding, the SAJBD remains committed to supporting a negotiated, two-state solution to the conflict, and will not be cowed by those, whether within the ANC or elsewhere in this country who wish to deny the Jewish community its right to identify with the Jewish homeland. They called on the ANC to play a constructive rather than destructive role in helping to realise their common goal of a sustainable peace in the Middle East.

Top Israeli judge to US: Free Pollard

Israel's Supreme Court Justice Elyakim Rubinstein has called for the US administration to pardon Jonathan Pollard, the American jailed since 1985 for spying on Israel's behalf.

Mistakes were made, mainly by the Israelis, but by the Americans as well, and 29 years was enough, said Rubinstein at a lecture at the Washington Institute for Near East Policy. Rubinstein is expected to be named deputy chief justice of the high court next year. *i24*



Chief Rabbi, Muslim leader in joint call to end violence



Chief Ashkenazi Rabbi of Israel, David Lau, and founder of the Islamic Movement, Sheikh Abdullah Nimar Darwish, called on leaders of both Abrahamic faiths to hold meetings aimed at reducing inter-religious tensions in Israel.

In a joint interview with *Israel Radio* ahead of the Jewish High Holiday of Yom Kippur and the Muslim celebration of Eid al-Adha, the two religious figures expressed hope that Jews and Arabs may soon achieve peace.

"We will announce that all religious leaders declare peace between the two religions and two nations, and will call on politicians to hasten the peace process," Darwish said.

"Let's make peace together, and organise a religious march in Tel Aviv or Kfar Kassem with the message that there should be quiet and an end to bloodshed, enough with the destruction, enough with the killing, enough with the hate." Rabbi Lau said he would be glad to meet with fellow religious leaders and spread this message.

Defence Minister Ya'alon rules out West Bank withdrawal

Israeli Defence Minister Moshe Ya'alon told the Institute for National Security Studies that in the aftermath of the Gaza war, talk of any Israeli withdrawal from the West Bank is irrational. If there was a withdrawal, how would the IDF defend Ben-Gurion Airport or Tel Aviv, he asked, adding that a mortar could be used to attack the airport from the nearby West Bank hilltops. If the IDF leaves, Hamas will take over and other terrorists groups such as the Islamic Jihad, al-Qaeda and Islamic State would operate in the West Bank, he added.

"When we talk about a new diplomatic horizon, we have to look for new directions," Ya'alon said. "The changing Middle East offers new regional opportunities. That is where we should seek new diplomatic horizons and not in the same concepts that have collapsed time after time." *JPost*



PM: No chance for peace deal if Israel sued for war crimes

A Palestinian push to try Israeli officials for war crimes at a United Nations tribunal would end any chance of reaching a peace deal, Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu said.

Netanyahu spoke a day after the Palestinian Authority's envoy to the UN said his government would join the International Criminal Court if the UN Security Council refuses to set a deadline for Israel to withdraw from all Palestinian territories.

"We may end up there," Netanyahu said of the prospect of war crimes charges being brought against Israel at the Hague-based UN tribunal. "If Abu Mazen attempts it, this will have dire consequences for any chance of a sane peace deal." *Times of Israel*

Israel gas deal will save Jordan \$986m annually

The Jordanian government said the state-owned National Electric Power Company is expected to buy 250-300 million cubic feet per day of natural gas from Israeli gas fields, which will save around \$986 million annually on Jordan's energy bill. *Jordan Times*

IAEA rejects Arab resolution to pressure Israel

A resolution proposed by Arab states expressing concern about Israel's alleged nuclear arsenal was defeated at a meeting of the UN's International Atomic Energy Agency.

The measure, brought by 18 Arab states, was rejected by 58 to 45, with 27 countries abstaining.

Israel's Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu praised the outcome of the vote, saying it represented "a rejection of repeated attempts by Arab countries to denigrate and isolate Israel at the Atomic Agency" as well as to shift the West's attention from Iran's rogue nuclear drive. *AFP*



High alert on Lebanon border after shooting incident

Israeli troops opened fire last Sunday at a group of unidentified armed individuals who crossed the border from Lebanon in the Har Dov area, wounding one of them. The group fled back across the border after being fired upon.

The IDF was investigating the incident, and released a statement saying, "The IDF will continue to protect the sovereignty of the State of Israel in the border area."

The statement described the group as a "squad" but would not say whether they were Lebanese soldiers or Hezbollah fighters. *Israel Hayom*

Jerusalem court: PA must compensate families for 2001 terror attack

The Jerusalem District Court has found the Palestinian Authority liable to pay compensation to the families of three people killed in a terror attack in 2001.

In 2009, the estates of Yaniv and Sharon Ben-Shalom, and that of Sharon's brother Doron Yosef Sviri, who were killed in a shooting attack on highway 443 in August 2001, sued the PLO and the Palestinian Authority.

Justice Moshe's Drori's decision held that the PA was legally obligated to pay damages to the victims' families and to those wounded in the attack.

Two daughters of Yaniv and Sharon Ben-Shalom were infants in 2001 and were wounded in the attack.

"The weapons and the funding were transferred from the Palestinian Authority to the commanders in the terrorist organisations, and the PA knew and understood the purpose for these transfers," Drori stated.

Judge Drori found that Marwan Barghout, a Palestinian leader serving life in prison for multiple deadly attacks, had knowledge of the 2001 shooting and had been given a report following the act. The contact person between Barghout and the terror organisation was Barghout's cousin as well as his personal driver. *JPost*



Israel: Iran testing nuclear detonation technology

Israel says that Iran has used its Parchin military base as the site for secret tests of technology that could be used only for detonating a nuclear weapon.

Intelligence Minister Yuval Steinitz said that, based on "highly reliable information," the implosion tests at Parchin involved neutron sources that would include nuclear material.

"The only possible purpose of such internal neutron sources is to ignite the nuclear chain reaction in nuclear weapons," he said.

Hamas renews rocket production

Hamas has returned to manufacturing rockets inside Gaza, after some 50 per cent of its rocket lathes were destroyed during the recent fighting. Hamas has fired five test rockets into the sea since the war ended a month ago. *IDF*

Professor Reuven Feuerstein, who died aged 92 in April 2014, was one of the great child psychologists of the world, a man who transformed lives and led severely brain-damaged children to achievements no one else thought possible. I knew him and admired him, and I was recording a tribute to him when his son told me a wonderful story.

Feuerstein had been working with a group of Native American Indians and they wanted to show their gratitude. So they invited him and his wife to their reservation. They were brought into the Indian chief's wigwam where the leaders of the tribe were sitting in a circle in full headdress.

As the traditional welcome ceremony began, the professor, an orthodox Jew from Jerusalem, was overwhelmed by the incongruity. He turned to his wife and said to her in Yiddish, "What would my mother say if she could see me now?!" To his amazement, the Indian chief turned to him and replied in Yiddish: "And what would she say if she knew I understood what you just said!"

The Yiddish-speaking Indian chief told Feuerstein his story. He had grown up in Europe as a religious Jew, but having survived the horrors of the Holocaust, he decided that he wanted to spend the rest of his life as far away as he could from Western civilization, so he joined the Indians and became their doctor. Feuerstein was the first Jew he had met in his self-imposed exile.

There are certain people around whom strange things happen and Reuven Feuerstein was one. Born in Romania, he studied psychology in Bucharest, but was forced to flee by the Nazi invasion. He settled in Israel after the war, and began by treating traumatised child survivors of the holocaust. Returning to Europe he completed his education at Geneva and the Sorbonne. Later he returned to Israel where he established the Institute for the Enhancement of Learning Potential.

He dedicated his life to children with disadvantages, some physical – autistic, brain-damaged and Down Syndrome children – and others cultural

or social. His methods have been adopted in more than 80 countries. He was a genius, a magician – a small, slight man with twinkling eyes. Children opened up to him like flowers in the sun.

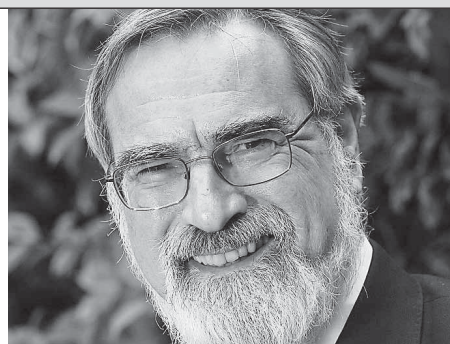
I tell his story because he was a deeply spiritual Jew. His methods were elaborate and his theories complex, but seeing him at work you knew that there were three reasons he achieved miracles. First, the basis of his work was love. He loved the children and they loved him. Second, he had transformative faith. Under him children developed skills no one thought they could because he believed they could. He had more faith in them than anyone else.

Third, he refused to write anyone off. He insisted that children with disabilities should be included in society like every other child. They too were in the image of God. They too had a right to respect. They too could lead a full and meaningful life.

I learned from Professor Feuerstein that faith really does change lives. The one thing that can rescue us from despair and failure to fulfil our potential is the knowledge that someone believes in us more than we believe in ourselves.

That is what God does. He believes in us more than we believe in ourselves. However many times we fail, He forgives us. However many times we fall, He lifts us. And He never gives up. As we say in Le-David Hashem ori ve-yishi: "My father and mother might abandon me but God will gather me in." (Psalm 27: 10).

At the heart of Judaism is one utterly transformative belief: our faith in God's faith in us. That, as Reuven Feuerstein, showed can lead us to a greatness we never knew we had.



Freedom & Survival

Post-liberal Europe and its Jewish problem

Strong ideological currents are turning the continent into a very difficult place for Jewish survival

Why should European Jews, or anyone for that matter, choose to hold fast to their particular identity in the face of so much pressure to abandon it? Because identity, Jewish or otherwise, imbues life with a meaning and purpose beyond mere material existence. It satisfies a basic human longing to be part of something bigger than oneself, an inter-generational community that shares a set of values and a sense of overarching purpose.

Of course, there is another basic human longing: the desire to be free, to think for oneself and choose one's own path. But these two basic desires – to belong and to be free – can reinforce rather than oppose one another. Freedom provides the opportunity to cultivate one's identity fully; but freedom must be defended, and identity gives one the strength

for that task. Just as it is a perilous mistake to sacrifice freedom for the sake of identity, it is a potentially disastrous mistake to jettison identity in the name of freedom, as today's European post-liberals have done in their belief that nothing is worth dying for.

Indeed, the real issue here is not the future of the Jews; as so often in history, Jews are a litmus test. What is really at stake is the future of Europe. The attempt to liberate itself from its history and its traditional institutions has made Europe decadent and weak.

Now that Islamic fundamentalism, an identity violently at odds with liberalism, has moved into the heart of tolerant, multicultural Europe, the question is whether a society that has run away from its identity in order to enjoy its freedom can muster the will to fight, before losing them both.

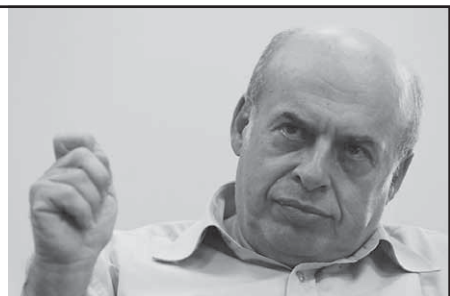
As one who grew up in the darker corners of Europe, and who garnered from the great European liberal tradition the strength to struggle against oppression, I can only hope that the democratic nation states of Europe will rediscover the capacity to fight for their freedom. But my task as an Israeli citizen is simpler.

I must make sure that every Jew in the world who feels homeless will be able to find a home here, in this small island of freedom in a great ocean of tyranny, in this small oasis of identity in a desert of post-identity anomie.

To these Jews I say: welcome to the Jewish democratic state.

ISRAEL & INDIA: High-tech marriage made in heaven

Even though the India-Israel relationship has remained low-key, both countries now have leaders at the helm who truly appreciate the benefit of better bilateral ties and are sincerely keen on developing them.

The India-Israel relationship is a rapidly growing work-in-progress, grounded in strong foundations of two proud people, united in shared values of democracy, tradition and innovation. In this context, the meeting between Prime Ministers Narendra Modi and Benjamin Netanyahu on the sidelines of the UNGA was historic and ground changing.

The meeting was predominantly focused on increased trade, diplomatic and defence ties between the two nations. But two areas received special attention. First, water and agriculture technology: Here, Israel is a world leader and there is a real demand for its know-how in India. Second, defence cooperation: Within this sector, there was special focus on cyber-security, which both leaders identified as a key strategic threat and where both nations have much experience and technology to offer. Netanyahu extended an offer for India to participate in a joint cyber-defence project, which would unite both the military and civilian high-tech defence sectors.

When Israel and India established full diplomatic relations in 1992, bilateral trade was \$200 million. Today it is \$6 billion. If the current trajectory is continued, by 2020, two-way trade can surpass \$10 billion.

Importantly, there is a growing positive reflection of Israel, and Israeli people, on the Indian street, with Indians strongly admiring Israel's breathtakingly successful entrepreneurial and innovative culture, especially for a nation that is only a miniscule fraction of its size and population. Indians are also increasingly seeing Israel as an ally in their battle against Islamic extremism.

The India-Israel relationship is based very much on mutual interest and benefit, especially in the field of technology, where Israeli high-tech and innovation meets India's vast work force of highly-educated, tech-savvy, English-speaking labour. It is, quite literally, a high-tech marriage made in heaven.

Looking ahead, there are four key areas of importance in the India-Israel bilateral: First, increased trade, and greater military cooperation against the joint security threat posed by growing militant Islam; second, India reducing its oil dependence on Iran, thereby removing a key source of revenue for the Iranian regime to fund in worldwide terror operations; third, greater support for Israel in international arenas, most notably at the United Nations; and finally, more high-level meetings between the nations, including an ambitious Government-to-Government meeting in Jerusalem and New Delhi. Hopefully, Mr Modi will take up Mr Netanyahu's offer to visit Israel in the near future to enhance and cement bilateral ties even further.



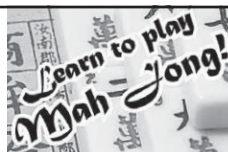

When Amanda left the mining company, her chairman told her he had seen a job vacancy at MZH for three days' work a week. This seemed ideal for her as, with twin babies, full-time work would have proved difficult. She applied for the job and got it but found that, far from working three days a week, the nature of the requirements at that time meant she often worked for five, even more days.

Since coming to MZH, Amanda has made enormous improvements to the accounting procedures and reporting procedures, but has been under a great deal of pressure to accomplish this. To assist in getting the accounting "up to scratch", prepare budgets and comply with audit requirements, a part-time Chartered Accountant, Jamie Rychin, was employed on a limited time basis and Amanda is very grateful for her contribution.

Part of Amanda's work includes assisting the various managers with their budgets and she also has given training in various aspects of their financial reporting, including using Excel and making improvements to the general financial education of staff. She has also given very helpful talks to the residents of the Retirement Village on requirements of the Retirement Villages Act.

Amanda is a very organised person – well, she has to be, to manage her responsibilities to the MZH as well as the needs of her family of husband, six-year-old son and 19-month-old twin boys who spend Amanda's working days at day care.

We are all grateful to have Amanda working for us. She is very committed to her job at MZH and is a very important, competent and hard-working part of our management team, who all work together to achieve the best possible results for the Home.

The aim of our celebration is to ensure that your soul dances within you, but your voice and body will be left intact... our Simchas Torah is truly one with a difference

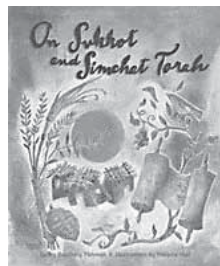
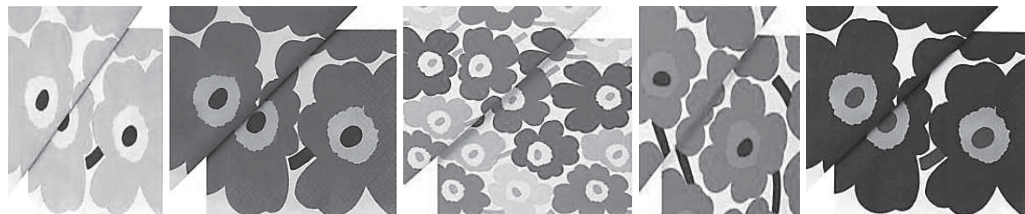

Booking is now open as JIFF heads to Perth for the first time! Festival highlights include the opening night film, *Gett, The Trial of Viviane Amsalem*. Receiving international critical acclaim, *Gett* premiered at Cannes this year and was recently awarded BEST FILM at the Israeli Oscars.

Gett is a contemporary exploration of divorce and long-term relationships punctuated by lighter moments. It is also a rare insight into the rabbinical court and its treatment of women. Viviane is refused a *gett*, a Jewish divorce, which can only be given by a court of rabbinical judges and with the consent of her husband.

The exhausting and absurd protocols Viviane is forced to endure, and the anguish caused by not being able to start a new life, does not stop her.

Closing night will see the screening of Nancy Spielberg's gripping documentary *Above and Beyond*. In 1948 rumours began – the United Nations was going to establish Israel as the Jewish state, provoking an attack from five surrounding Arab armies. A group of World War II pilots, American and South African, volunteered to fight for Israel in the War of Independence. These men were the 'Machal'. Wearing German helmets, uniforms and parachutes, this ragtag band of brothers flew planes left behind in Europe by the German army and made of spare parts.

Above and Beyond tells the little-known history of the scavenging and deal-making that supplied aircraft parts and planes for the men who turned the tide of this war and established Israel's now-enviable air force.

Other film highlights include the Venice Film Festival's Audience Award winner and entertaining dark comedy, *The Farewell Party*. As well as *Zero Motivation*, an hilarious female-driven army story. The film is also one of Israel's highest grossing films at the box office and was a major award winner at the Tribeca Film Festival.

There are a number of films about notable Jewish figures, among them: *The Outrageous Sophie Tucker*, *Regarding Susan Sontag*, *Etgar Keret*, *Theodore Bikel*, and the famous *Go-Go Boys* surrounding Menahem Golan and Yoram Globus who created the cult film studio Canon Films.

Nadav Schirman's Sundance Award Winning documentary, *The Green Prince*, is also on the program.
